PAST PERFORMANCE FY 2022/2023

Financial performance

• In financial year 2023/2024 Natural Resources Department was allocated only **0.12%** of the total district budget while the budget allocation for financial year 2025/2026 is sh. 66,756,944 (**0.15%**). This is still low level of funding and reduces the ability to effectively manage the current environmental challenges in the district.

PHYSICAL PERFORMANCE FOR FY 2023/2024 TO DATE

Inspections and Compliance:

- Inspected Bushenyi Sugar Works, Kigumba Tea, and Nyambya Tea Factories for environmental compliance.
- Conducted compliance checks in Kyenjojo Town Council, Kyakatwire, Kyarusozi, and Butunduzi Town Councils.

Community Engagement and Sensitization:

- Held sensitization meetings along River Mpanga in Kyenjojo District.
- Participated in District Security Committee meetings to protect Central Forest Reserves (CFRs).

PHYSICAL PERFORMANCE FOR FY 2023/2024 TO DATE CONT'

Wetland Protection and Restoration:

- Evicted encroachers in Kirima wetlands and Kaitanyana.
- Led restoration activities in Kigoyera, Kihuura, and Kyenjojo Town Council.
- Approved five wetland user permits in Katooke and other areas.

Planning and Project Assessments:

- Conducted environmental screenings for district road and water projects.
- Held five physical planning committee meetings for land and building applications approval.

KEY PRIORITIES FOR FY 2025/ 2026

Forest Extension and Sustainable Management:

- Promote sustainable management of forests on private land.
- Support tree nursery establishment and management.

Law Enforcement and Patrols:

- Conduct forest patrols to prevent illegal activities.
- Replant and maintain trees in Local Forest Reserves, including Bugaaki Sub-county.

Boundary and Tree Assessment:

- Resurvey and re-open Butiiti and Nyantungo Local Forest Reserve boundaries (funding-dependent).
- Assess trees for licensing purposes to support controlled harvesting.

KEY PRIORITIES FOR FY 2025/ 2026

Community Sensitization on Climate Change:

- Educate farmers on climate-smart agriculture, including agroforestry.
- Raise awareness on land policies, land tenure, and sustainable land registration processes.

Waste and Water Management:

- Collaborate with Town Councils on proper waste management and disposal.
- Work with the Ministry of Water and Environment to protect water catchment areas and riverbanks.

Wetland and Ecosystem Protection:

 Partner with NEMA and stakeholders to safeguard wetlands and promote biodiversity.

KEY PRIORITIES FOR FY 2025/ 2026

Project Environmental Screening:

 Screen new projects for environmental impact in 2025/2026, recommending mitigation measures.

Building and Development Compliance:

- Approve building plans and monitor structural developments for environmental compliance.
- Increase field surveillance to inspect sites for illegal developments.

Land Documentation and Investment Facilitation:

- Document, survey, and title district (government) land for potential investment opportunities.
- Process land applications and ensure efficient registration and titling.

POLICY CHANGES IN THE DEPARTMENT

- National environment Act of 2019
- National Environment (Environment and social Impact Assessment Regulation)
- Physical planners registration Act 2022

KEY EXECUTION CHALLENGES

- Low prioritization of Natural Resources Management at all levels of Gov't hence inadequate budget provisions
- Lack of field staff to implement and enforce environment policies and laws.
- Declining forest resources and forest cover for timber revenues and climate change mitigation respectively
- Most developers don't have land titles, yet it's a mandatory requirement to have one to qualify for development permission. As a result, illegal and un-standardized developments continue coming up everywhere.
- The new land application procedures have caused a decline in land applications hence reduced land revenues

WAY FORWARD

 Lobby Central government and donor support to fund Natural Resources Conservation

• The district should make ordinances to facilitate effective delivery, coordination and regulation of Physical Planning services. e.g produce a schedule of fees charged to prospective developers when they submit development applications (e.g building plans for approval).

CONCLUSION

 The current exploitation of the Natural Resources is unsustainable.

 Current investment in District Natural Resources Sector is very limited hence ineffective management and administration of the sector.

• To mitigate the effects of climate change, significant investment need to be made to combat land and natural resources degradation, protect the environment
